Basic Child Rearing Rules and Errors (Behavior Management Rules and Errors)

What can you do to help your child improve his or her behavior? Follow three basic behavior management rules and avoid four errors. These rules and errors are discussed in Chapter 1 of SOS Help For Parents.

Three Child Rearing Rules (Behavior Management Rules)

- Rule #1. Reward good behavior (Positive reinforcement of appropriate behavior)

 Do apply three positive reinforcers, at lower right.
- Rule #2. Don't "accidentally" reward bad behavior. (Extinction of inappropriate behavior) Do withold the three positive reinforcers, at lower right, following the inappropriate behavior.
- Rule #3. Correct some bad behavior (Correction punishment of inappropriate behavior) Do apply five mild corrections, following inappropriate behavior.

"Accidentally" Causing Behavior Problems (Behavior Management Errors)

- Error #1. Parents fail to reward good behavior.

 (Extinction of appropriate behavior)

 Error Witholding three positive reinforcers, lower right
- Error #2. Parents "accidentally" correct good behavior.

 (Correction punishment of appropriate
 behavior) Error Applying five mild corrections, see next page
- Error #3. Parents "accidentally" reward bad behavior.

 (Positive reinforcement of inappropriate

 behavior) Error Applying three positive reinforcers, lower right
- Error #4. Parents fail to correct bad behavior (<u>Failure to correct punish inappropriate behavior</u>)

Rewards Children Like



"That's great! You're learning to tie your own shoes!"

It's important to reward your child's good behavior. Rewarding good behavior is the easiest and best way to improve behavior. What rewards should parents use? Rewards that motivate children are social rewards, activity rewards, and material rewards.

Social rewards are the most important! When you use material rewards use only small ones.

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How To Give Effective Instructions And Commands To Your Child

(Rex Forehand research)

All parents must be able to give clear, effective instructions and commands on occasion. They must also be able to "back up" their commands. A command is a request to immediately start or stop a behavior.

When are commands given? Give your child a command when you want him to stop a specific misbehavior and you believe that he might disobey a simple request to stop the misbehavior. Also, give a command when you want your child to start a simple behavior and you believe that your child might disobey a simple request to start the behavior.

How should you give a command? Follow the guidelines listed below:

Giving Effective Commands To Your Child

Parents Check List ____ Steps To Follow: ____ 1. Move close to your child. ___ 2. Have a stern facial expression. ___ 3. Say his or her name. ___ 4. Get and maintain eye contact. ___ 5. Use a firm tone of voice. ___ 6. Give a direct, simple, and clear command. ___ 7. "Back up" your command if necessary.
